Dedication of Veterans Memorial on Holiday

CHELMSFORD — Dedication exercises starting at 10:30 Saturday morning, at the East Chelmsford monument will see the culmination of an effort which had its small beginning in August of 1942.

At that time, a civilian defense group, at an informal meeting, felt it would be appropriate to erect a staff from which to fly the colors, thereby acknowledging with appreciation the efforts of local men and women who were involved in protesting and preserving our freedoms. The concept met with universal approval and the resulting monument, erected largely by volunteer workers, was dedicated on November 11, 1943—complete except for the names of those to be honored. Saturday, appropriate services will complete this acknowledgment.

The executive boards of the East Chelmsford Residential Association and local Post 350 have completed plans for a program befitting the occasion. Selections Edgar P. George, Raymond J. Greenwood and Robert E. McAndrews have received invitations to attend, along with Rep. Vernon Fletcher, town council. It is hoped, too, that Rep. Bradford Morse will be among those present.

Rare Teapot at Museum

BOSTON (UPI)—A rare teapot, fashioned by silversmith Paul Revere, has been given to the Boston Museum of Fine Arts.

The teapot is much the same as the one which Revere holds in the famous portrait of him by John Singleton Copley.

Museum Director Perry Rathbone said it was known the teapot was not the identical one which Revere held in the painting "but it's so close to it...much closer to it than has ever come to light to date."

It was given to the museum from the estate of Beatrice Turner Maynard. It is believed the teapot was made by Revere between 1790 and 1795.
