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Chelmsford Marine Killed In Action in Viet Nam

CHELMSFORD — Corporal Rudolph H. Lefebvre, Jr., 23, U. S. Marine Corps, was killed in action July 18 in Quang Tri province, South Viet Nam. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph H. Lefebvre, 2 Crosby Way, Chelmsford, formerly of 18 Old Stage Road.

Corporal Lefebvre enlisted in the Marine Corps October 4, 1953 and had volunteered for duty in Viet Nam where he had served since February of this year with Company L, 3rd Battalion, 4th Regiment, 3rd Marine Division.

He was educated in Chelmsford and Lowell schools and was a graduate of Daley Junior high school, Lowell.

His parents were notified of his death Sunday and Marine officials stated that the body would be shipped home within a week or 10 days.

Corporal Lefebvre was the brother of Mrs. Marvin Pritchard, 19 Old Stage Rd., Chelmsford.

His father is employed by Edward Flanagan and Sons, painting contractors, Chelmsford.

Brazil Arrests 126 Reds

BRASILIA, Brazil (Reuters)—Police have arrested 126 known Communists in connection with a bid at both attacks here which killed three persons and injured several others.

The bomb blasts ripped through the city's Guararapes airport, Students' Union headquarters, and U.S. Information Service theater yesterday.

Gen. Damasceno Portugal, commander of the Fourth Army based here, ordered the rounding up of all known local Communists for questioning.

The airport bomb went off exactly when Marshall Arthur da Costa e Silva, the pro-government party's candidate in the Oct. 3 presidential election, was due to fly in on a campaign tour.

A retired admiral, the state secretary of education and a policeman died in the explosion — but the marshal was not there. He arrived by car because his plane had engine trouble.

State Security Chief Gen. Valente de Medeiros said all known Communists and anyone else who could be suspected would be summarily arrested. He reminded members of Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro's threat at the tri-continental conference in Havana that a "wave of terrorism" would be started in Brazil.

Succumbs to Rare Kidney Disease

BEVERLY (UPI)—Funeral services will be held Thursday for Ralph Carvonal, who succumbed to a rare kidney disease after a valiant battle against the ailment.

Carvonal, a father of four, died Monday at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital of a massive cerebral hemorrhage which doctors said was not directly related to his kidney condition.

FOR THE LAST three years Carvonal had been kept alive by a machine that took over his functions but his own damaged kidneys were unable to perform. During the last year he underwent three operations twice weekly using a leased machine.

His medical bills ran to \$10,000 annually, a sum which Beverly residents helped him raise by staging bazaars, cake sales, musical shows, dances and athletic events.

Recently Carvonal had felt better, and he returned to his job as an auto parts salesman last Wednesday. He planned to receive a kidney transplant in September.

He was stricken and taken to the hospital early Monday.

Lema Plane Crash Probed

LANSING, Ill. (AP)—A Civil Aeronautics Board investigative team searched today for new clues to the crash of a private plane that killed golfing star Tony Lema, his wife and two other persons.

George Green, CAB field superintendent, said investigators were looking into the possibility of engine failure.

The twin-engine craft was en route to the Chicago-Hammond Airport from Akron, Ohio, where Lema had just competed in the PGA tourney.

The pilot, Doris Miller, 43, of Joliet, Ill., and the copilot, Dr. George Bard, 41 of Kankakee Ill., also died when the small plane crashed and burned on a golf course.

Lema, 32, and his wife, Betty, were going to Oledo, Ill., where the 1964 British open champion was scheduled to play in Monday's \$12,000 Lincolnshire Open.

Two Killed by Midget Racing Car

OTTAWA, Ohio (AP)—The annual Funtime Cruisery Fair ended Friday night with screams and near-panic when a midget racing car crashed a fence, killing two teenage spectators and injuring at least seven other persons.

Thousands were at the fairgrounds race track when the accident occurred as the final night of the six-day fair drew toward a close.

The race driven by Jim Healy of Belle Creek, Mich., attempting to avoid another car that had skidded, rammed the fence.

Charles Horstman, 19, was killed instantly. He suffered a skull fracture. Gary D. Norden, 18, was dead on arrival at a Lima hospital.

Another seven persons were taken to St. Rita's Hospital in Lima, 26 miles away. Five were admitted, one in serious condition.

Healy was among them, with head and facial injuries.

Witnesses said one of the youths killed had been sitting atop concrete enclosing a man's rest room but jumped down into the car's path as it slammed into a section where spectators were standing about 250 feet back of the fenced grandstand.

The other victim was rolled up in the wove-wire fence as the runaway car tore down some 100 feet of it before going on through and hitting a power pole.

Healy's car, the only one that was wrecked, did not overturn.

Voice From the Past Says Earhart Died as U. S. Spy

NAPA, Calif. (AP)—Amelia Earhart, the aviatrix whose mysterious disappearance in the South Pacific gained her a place in American folk history, died as a U.S. spy, according to a Japanese-held island, according to a copyright newspaper story.

The Napa Register said Monday that the pioneer woman flier was captured by the Japanese on Saipan in 1942 while she completed an intelligence mission to inspect and photograph fortifications on Pacific islands.

Her body and that of navigator Frederick Noonan were secretly returned to the United States in 1946, according to the report. The newspaper said Miss Earhart died of dysentery and Noonan was beheaded.

A State Department spokesman in Washington said his files showed no evidence Miss Earhart was on an intelligence mission or that she was captured by the Japanese.

THE OFFICIAL version of Miss Earhart's disappearance is that her plane apparently went down somewhere between Lan, New Guinea, and Howland Island, on the first leg of a flight to Honolulu and Oakland, Calif.

The Register said it based its conclusion that Miss Earhart was on an espionage mission upon scrutiny of "classified files in the Department of State."

The report cited "sources of native" on the island who told newsmen Frederick Goerner of radio station KGBS in San Francisco of a white man and woman being held captive by the Japanese. Goerner launched the investigation in 1940 and was joined by the Register three years ago.

One woman was quoted as saying: "The woman the Japanese called the flier died of dysentery. She could not be helped. The man who came to the island with her was associated several days after her death. The Japanese beheaded him with a Samurai sword."

According to the Register, two former U.S. Marines, Everett Reardon Jr. of Sacramento, Calif., and Billy Burke, now living in Texas, found the remains of two bodies on the island in 1941.

When they asked a supervising officer "what are you looking for," the newspaper said, he replied, "Have you ever heard of Amelia Earhart?"

Missing Since 1937

Amelia Earhart, famed 38-year-old aviatrix, was on a spying mission for the U. S. government when she disappeared somewhere in the Pacific in July, 1937, the Napa, Calif., Register said yesterday. She died of dysentery on the island of Saipan, the newspaper said in a copyright story, and soon after, her navigator, Frederick J. Noonan, was beheaded. Their remains, The Register said, were recovered in Saipan in 1944 and secretly returned to America.


